On March 18th, as the world went quiet in the face of the Coronavirus pandemic, there was a very special birthday celebration taking place in a house in Winnipeg.

With her immediate family around her, little Éveline turned one year old.

It marked a huge landmark in this brave child's fight for life. Her mother Candice calls it, "a day we sometimes didn't think we'd see."

When Candice was 18 weeks pregnant with Éveline an ultrasound showed that the baby's kidneys were enlarged. By 23 weeks, her bladder wasn't working and she had no amniotic fluid left.

But mom, Candice, and dad, Marquis, held onto their faith that they would see their little girl one day.

And that day came earlier than expected.

At just 34 weeks, Éveline was born via emergency C-section. The tiny infant couldn't breathe on her own. It took four hours just to stabilize her enough to move her to the NICU. Candice and Marquis were warned that their daughter may not survive her first 24 hours.

But Éveline had different plans.

On day three she had surgery to fit a dialysis catheter. On day six, she started dialysis.

For the next three months, she lived in the intensive care unit – fighting each and every day for her life.

Finally at four months old, Éveline made it home to her family.

Her family will never forget the teams of people who saved her. The Children's Hospital family at HSC Winnipeg. The doctors, nurses, staff – and supporters like you.

"The most amazing doctors, nurses and staff took us in like we were family. They cared for Éveline like she was their own. Éveline's journey isn't finished, but we're so thankful that we have such a great place taking care of her for years to come."

The family are passionate supporters of the hospital now – as you can read more about on page three.

"When we donate, we know directly how it affects each and every child, mom and dad, and siblings. It gives them hope, it gives them compassion and empathy. It gives them someone to talk to. It makes them feel they're not alone when their world has just been turned upside down."

## You give children joy and comfort through books

For the last 58 years, the Children's Hospital Book Market has been a much-loved hospital fundraiser.

And it's raised over \$8 million for kids in the hospital!

Along with other vital services and programs, this volunteer-run book market has helped fund the Book Corner, CHTV (the internal, commercial-free TV station here at the hospital) and the Family Resource Library.

"Books help to distract children during their hospital stay. Just last year alone, over 1,000 patients at Children's Hospital had a book read to them by library staff," says librarian Emma Robin.

The Book Corner is a lending library for in-patients and their families, offering books, DVDs, and magazines for all ages. Library staff read with kids one-on-one, and visit the wards with book and DVD lending carts every day.

## Meet Brady, our new Champion Child

Brady is proud to be the 2020 Champion Child, where he will be the ambassador for the 130,000 children helped by the Children's Hospital each year. At 5 months old, Brady's parents noticed unusual spots on his body. He was later diagnosed with Type 1 Neurofibromatosis, a genetic disorder that causes tumours to form on nerve tissue. ## Children's Hospital is conducting critical research on COVID-19 and kids



Dr. Terry Klassen, CEO and Scientific Director at the Children's Hospital Research Institute of Manitoba (CHRIM), and Professor in the Department of Pediatrics & Child Health at the University of Manitoba, is co-leading a new global study into how COVID-19 affects children.

So far it seems that the virus presents more mildly in children than in adults – particularly seniors and those with underlying health conditions.



But, as Dr. Klassen says, "It can happen, and so we need to be prepared. We need to recognize it early and ensure that children get the best care possible. Children are still picking up the virus. You have to be aware they may have the infection, but have no signs of it. So we have to be very vigilant of how this may be spreading in the community."

Dr. Klassen is working with the University of Calgary's Dr. Stephen Freedman. They are leading a collaboration with 50 pediatric units from 19 different countries.

"We will be looking at which children are at risk of getting COVID-19 first of all and then, of those that get the disease, which are the ones in which it will be more severe."

The international collaboration means that our researchers will get the data they need to gather

accurate information on which kids could potentially get really sick.

Children's Hospital is also part of the national network, TREKK (Translating Emergency Knowledge for Kids). The network's focus is to improve children's emergency care across Canada, particularly in communities without dedicated pediatric services.

When COVID-19 started to spread globally, TREKK sprang into action, developing practical guidance and a pediatric COVID-19 fact sheet within a week.

In keeping with our commitment to support families, we know that Emergency Department (ED) visits are often stressful for parents and caregivers, but uncertainties around COVID-19 may cause even more anxiety for families going to the ED. That's why the TREKK team at HSC Winnipeg Children's Hospital Winnipeg helped develop an interactive infographic for parents on what to expect at the ED, with a specific section on COVID-19. The infographic walks parents through the process, including triage, the waiting room, interactions with emergency staff, and what to expect at discharge.

With every department at the hospital – from our medical teams to researchers to family support staff – your Children's Hospital is ensuring that any child affected by COVID-19 in our community has the very best care available.
